Congratulations to Jeff Latter who was recently awarded the Stan Henwood Award by the Shire of Cardinia. Jeff has made a significant impact in the Emerald area for many years.

The CEO of the Cardinia Shire, Carol Jeffs, attended our recent EVA meeting. Planning, the Shire's budget, community funding for the upgrade to the Emerald Village Playground (near the PBR station) and the use of the Hills Hub were discussion points. A report is included in this newsletter.

On Saturday May 20th Lynne Trensky and her EDRA team organised a very successful gathering (EXPO) of community groups and organisations in our district. This and the Trivia night that followed in the Hills Hub hall were well supported by the community.

The EVA is following up objections to the building project (medical centre) on the main road near the new shops. We believe this development is on the agenda for the next Shire Council meeting.

## **Rotary Club of Emerald & District**

### Dr. Ian (Spud) Macleod Murphy Foundation

Dr. Murphy was an old-style doctor who retired to Emerald to breed turkeys after a distinguished career in the Navy. In 1944 he came out of retirement to become the first GP in the Hills. He practised for 37 years, establishing the Emerald Medical Centre in the old Post Office in the centre of town. The laneway beside the surgery was named Murphys Way in honour of his decades of service and in 1977 he was awarded the British Empire Medal for services to the health of the community.

In 1981 a fund was set up in Dr. Murphy's name, for Emerald Rotary to be overseers for medical and allied service scholarships to students living in the hills. This has been handled each year (except through COVID) by our Vocational Chair and this year Rotarian Susi Wilson, a pharmacist at Emerald Village Pharmacy was able to find 5 worthy candidates. To allow the Trust to retain sufficient funds to perpetuate, Emerald Rotary contributed additional funds and local medical and allied health related businesses gave sponsorship: thank you Emerald Medical Centre, Emerald Village Pharmacy, Emerald Psychology Practice, and the Avonsleigh Veterinary Clinic.

On Tuesday 9<sup>th</sup> May President Marcus Adams presented each candidate (along with the scholarship) a certificate and a copy of a Historical item posted in "The Trader" in March 2017. The five applicants that Emerald Rotary was thrilled to sponsor are Lillian Mackay studying a Bachelor of Paramedicine, Vanessa Dewar studying a Bachelor of Nursing and Midwifery, Shae Jones studying a postgraduate degree in Pharmacy, Tahlia Rossitto studying a Bachelor of Psychology, Ruby Mulloy-Koning who has completed a Nursing degree and now studying a Bachelor of Paramedicine. They each received \$1000 towards their fees.

Mother's Day boosted the stall holders and public attendance of the **Emerald Rotary Market** and to top it all the weather was good. It had one of the best "vibes" so far and the music had everyone happy to be there. Supplies at the BBQ stall needed topping up several times as we kept selling out of egg and bacon rolls. An excellent end to summer and we now take a break for the winter months.

Saturday 20<sup>th</sup> May was busy for our members involved in 3 events. We partnered with EDRA (Eastern Dandenong Ranges Association) to run a Rotary stand at their Community Groups Expo and were pleased with how many people showed genuine interest in becoming involved with our Club. At the same time, we partnered for the 2<sup>nd</sup> year with The Salvation Army to collect funds for their Red Shield Appeal, with a strategic position outside the Emerald Village Bakery. And in the evening our Club put forward a strong team for EDRA's Trivia evening.



At Tuesday night's meeting on 30th May a normal Rotary meeting became a blockbuster held during the International Rotary Convention.

79 attended our meeting when 12 American Rotarians from the State of Alabama, 5 Singapore Rotarians and the New Zealand Rotary International President's Personal Representative, Leanne Jagg, joined the Club with past members, prospective members, friends and many members other Clubs including the Presidents of Belgrave and Monbulk to celebrate and show the strength and reach of Rotary both locally and internationally.

During the night our Club inducted 3 new members; presented the late Chris Adams' legacy funds totaling \$2,200 to Lung transplant expert Professor Greg Snell who gave a fascinating presentation; the Spangles performed "Leanne ... RIPPR!!!"; the Club awarded a PHF (Paul Harris Fellow) sapphire to Kristine Ash - a greatly deserved honour; we enjoyed great food and there was plenty of fun. The meeting was enjoyed by all and was an amazing celebration of Rotary.

June promises to be even busier than May with our 2<sup>nd</sup> Bubbles & Brushstrokes event in conjunction with the Emerald Art Society held on 2<sup>nd</sup> June - a great night had by all - separate article below.

### **EVA Monthly Meeting**

Ears were open and pencils poised at our May Emerald Village Association meeting. Our guest, the CEO of the Cardinia Council, Carol Jeffs, spoke at length, explaining issues on the topic of Budget pressures and answering questions submitted prior to and at the meeting. It was an interesting and informative discussion time.

Cardinia Costs are up 30% to 40% and some Tenders and Contracts have been re-let up to 3 times. Labour shortages and higher costs across the board have led to the current period being one of the toughest on record.

A question was asked about how the Hills Hub, an \$8.3 million dollar facility, could have its use fully maximised. Carol explained budget pressures would not allow the employment of a Placemaker, nor the provision of a Customer Service Centre.

The Council's main focus in Emerald is currently on the Emerald Lake Masterplan. Sheila Hampson, President of the Friends of Emerald Lake Volunteer Group, expressed concern about parking problems on Emerald Lake Road, with a narrow road and tourist buses using the route to get to the Discovery Centre. Another issue was the lack of a made path along that road for pedestrians. Carol Jeffs committed to putting these issues on the Emerald Lake Masterplan Agenda.

Planning for Emerald fits currently within the Hills Township Planning strategy and it covers residential, economic, traffic etc. Planning for updating of the Strategy should be advertised at the end of this year or early next year. All planning fits within State planning requirements.

# Other issues that came up at the meeting included:

\* EVA response to the Council Budget. Cardinia Council's borrowings are projected to rise from \$16 million to \$46 million over the next 4 to 5 years.

\*Emerald Secondary College Leadership Program - being supported by the EVA.

\*Communications - Newsletter sponsorships for the next 12 months are currently being arranged.

\* A new Photocopier to print the Newsletter needs to be obtained. A Grant is being applied for, together with possible sponsorship from local businesses.

\* Planning is underway for a Community Meeting specifically for helping new young families in the Emerald District.

### **Emerald U3A**

The U3A had its AGM at the end of May, and two new members were elected to vacant positions i.e.

Russell Soderlund is replacing Maurie Lean as Treasurer; and Tanya Cooke is replacing Mal Bowmaker as Course Coordinator. Roy Bowyer, who joined the Committee some months ago, will be the U3A Network Delegate. That had also been filled by Mal Bowmaker. These are all important roles and we welcome them all. The replacement for retiring Events Manager Helen Waring is still open pending a change to how these will be run being finalised.

At this time of year we submit membership data to U3A Network, and it is interesting to note that of our 373 active members, only 125 are male. Basically, there are twice as many women as men. Why would that be? Are you of the right gender to make a small dent in that statistic?? Our ages are mostly spread amongst those in their 60's (140) their 70's (170) and their 80's (47).






# "Bank with the Bendigo"

# Johns Hill Landcare Group

# Submission for Jeff Latter re Stan Henwood Award

Johns Hill Landcare Group was pleased to nominate Jeff Latter for the 2023 Stan Henwood Award in association with other groups that provided letters of support. Jeff is a foundation member of Johns Hill Landcare Group and has been on the Group executive since 2003 and is currently Vice President. Jeff has supported a wide range of successful community initiatives over many years. This is both through his role as a consultant, assessing vegetation and preparing tree, native vegetation, and bushfire management reports for development applications and as a community advocate. Jeff's passion and expertise have been instrumental in achieving outcomes. Jeff was the Emerald Citizen of the year in 2011.

#### Meander

Whilst working for local government in 1990, he was involved in the establishment of Meander, an early environment group in Emerald. He joined Meander in late 1990's and remained a member until 2014 when Meander restructured and became an activity group within Johns Hill Landcare Group.

#### Liwik Barring Landscape Conservation Area

In 2005 Jeff arranged a forum "my creek, your creek our creeks" in conjunction with the Meander AGM. The forum was the first step that led to the formation Woori Yallock Creek Park Alliance which comprised 18 community groups. Jeff as convenor of the Alliance, prepared "A park for today - Yellingbo State Emblems Park" which outlined the values and need for greater protection of public land between the Dandenong Ranges National Park, Kurth Kiln and Bunyip Parks and the Yarra Ranges National Park. Government referral to the Victorian Environment Assessment Council (VEAC) resulted in the recommendation and Government acceptance of a new park, which is now known as Liwik Barring Landscape Conservation Area of approximately 3000 hectares. Not only is this a new park but it is also the first of a new type of park under the National Parks Act. During this fourteen-year journey, Jeff worked on every Committee, and through every structure set up by the government. The first parts of the new park (about 1790 hectares) were created in 2020.

### Hogan Park Committee of Management

Jeff was elected as secretary to the Hogan Park CoM in 2001. He steered the CoM to become incorporated and advocated for part of the closed government road to be added to the reserve and the reservation to be changed to Conservation. Jeff remains Secretary of Hogan Park (Emerald) CoM Inc.

#### **Emerald Scouts**

Jeff has strong ties with Emerald Scout Group having been a youth member in the 1960's, 70's and 80's including being Emerald's first Baden Powell Rover Scout Awardee in 1983. Returning to Scouting as an adult in 2005 Jeff took on various roles in the Group Support Committee including developing a vision and advocating for the upgrading of the Emerald Scout Centre. The centre upgrade was completed and opened in 2013. Jeff's role with Scouting pivoted following the completion of the upgrade and he is currently Group Leader. He was presented the Meritorious Service Award in 2016.

### A LITTLE BIT OF EMERALD HISTORY FOR YOU Bob James Emerald Quarry Reserve

The Cardinia Shire Council owned Emerald Quarry Reserve. It was about 3.2 hectares in area and separated from Liwik Barring Landscape Conservation Area by Emerald - Monbulk Road. The adjoining property to the south contained very high-quality bushland and Jeff Latter considered that this bushland would make a great addition to the reserve and the Emerald Star bush plants it contained.

The Trust for Nature was gifted land in Charman Avenue by Bob James. This land had been sold and some of the proceeds of the sale had been set aside for local conservation. When the adjoining property came on the market Jeff advocated to Trust for Nature for the purchase of the property. In 2011 the Trust for Nature purchased the site. Rather than covenanting and reselling the whole property Jeff advocated for subdivision of the Trust property into a lot to be sold with covenant and the transfer of bushland to the Council as an addition to the Emerald Quarry Reserve. The subdivision and transfer of the reserve to the Council and the sale of the remainder of 106 Emerald Monbulk Road with a covenant was completed in 2014. The site

was named Bob James Emerald Quarry Reserve in recognition of the historical use of the site as a soft rock quarry by Council. The funds from the sale of Bob James' land enabled the Trust for Nature to complete the purchase, subdivision, and transfer to the Council 2.1 hectares of the land. Johns Hill Landcare Group added to the project by obtaining a grant to enable pine trees and debris on the Trust land to be removed.

The Emerald Quarry had been used as a site for disposal of table drain cleaning for many years up to the early 2000's but the floor of the quarry became a significant weed source to the adjoining bushland. Jeff started advocating for the floor of the quarry to be capped to permanently solve the weed issue and allow for revegetation. The first attempt was to try and get soil from the Emerald police station excavation, but timing was not right. Council allocated funds for hire of equipment to spread excavated soil and this provided flexibility in obtaining and managing soil.

In early 2019 fill from commercial development in Emerald was available and delivered to the site. Several thousand cubic metres of fill capped the site. A Council organised community tree planting was undertaken and about 700 plants were planted, and the site was largely revegetated.
