EMERALD CITIZEN AWARDS - 2021

The 2021 Emerald Citizenship Awards aim to acknowledge local individuals and a local group or organisation that have made outstanding contributions to our local community.

This year we are also seeking nominations for community groups in our district who have made a significant difference over the last 18 months. ROTARY CLUB OF EMERALD & DISTRICT

The core focus of Rotary's work continues to be on supporting the Help the Hills initiative, to assist locals get back on their feet after the June storm event. From supporting project administration to clearing debris on private properties and helping out at the Kalorama Relief Centre, our volunteering efforts have spanned a broad range of activities. We've also contributed approximately \$3,000, with funds going towards providing firewood and food to those in need, replacing equipment and toys at a local preschool and helping a wildlife shelter care for injured and/or displaced native animals. At the District level, Rotary has established a fund-raising effort with the aim of delivering various community recovery projects in late 2021 and early 2022.

While the pandemic and its associated restrictions and lockdowns make planning events challenging, we are hopeful of being able to run a number of our signature events in coming months, many of which raise funds for worthy community causes.

Forthcoming events include running the Deb Ball for Emerald Secondary College students (rescheduled six times already!), speech competition for local primary schools, Cocktails on the Catwalk promoting local fashion outlets and Kids Fun Run With Thomas, scheduled for Sunday, 24 October.

What a rollercoaster of a month July 2021 turned out to be. And for the Emerald Village Association trying to hold a Community Meeting - Planning for a future Emerald. We changed dates and possible attendee numbers and finally cancelled!

We appreciated the interest that this topic has drawn, from the establishment of the EVER (Emerald Village Exercise and Recreation) Facebook Group with 380 new Members to our own Planning Committee meeting to draw up a number of questions to ask the Chief Strategic Planner from Cardinia Council.

We have finally moved the date of the Meeting - **Planning Emerald's Future** - to **Wednesday 25th August** in the Hills Hub. All groups, individuals and interested people are invited. The meeting will be run under Covid Safe protocols with QR or signing in protocol, hand sanitizing and social distancing from 7.15 pm for a 7.30pm start.

On a lighter note - literally-the new Community Roadside sign that the Dandenong Ranges Energy Association has suggested be lit at night (replacing the currently crumbling one close to the Puffing Billy Crossing), has raised a fair bit of interest. HOGAN PARK

Hogan Park is a 2.1 hectare bushland reserve located on Kilvington Drive Emerald adjoining the Emerald Scout Centre, the Puffing Billy Railway to the north and Pepis Land to the east and south.

The Reserve is crown land managed by a volunteer committee of management appointed by DELWP every three years.

The objectives of the Committee of Management are to:

• Manage Hogan Park to enhance its environmental values consistent with government approved Victorian Environment and Assessment Council land use recommendations.

• Seek funds through grants to reduce weed infestation within or adjoining the reserve

• Engage with interested community groups and individuals regarding the management of the reserve.

The term of the current Management Committee expires on the 30th August and a new committee will be nominated to DELWP at a public meeting to be held on Sunday 15th August at the Scout Hall, 21 Kilvington Drive, Emerald (or Zoom if lockdown prevails).

All positions will be declared vacant, and nominations will be accepted prior to or during the meeting. Nominations from women, Aboriginal people, people with disabilities, young people and people from culturally diverse backgrounds are encouraged.

COUNCIL WORKS AROUND EMERALD

The Shire has repaired a number of footpaths in Main Road, Kilvington Drive, Kings Road, Anne Street and many others.

Work on the car park in Worrell Reserve will commence soon. If you park regularly outside the Hills Hub, you will need to find alternative parking for 4-6 weeks during the construction.

Our understanding is that a budget and a contract has been negotiated by Council to replace the current toilet block outside the Hills Hub. Given the building will be demolished to make way for a facility that meets current health standards the building will not be suitable for any murals to be painted.

"Since moving to Kings Road we have noticed a vehicle log jam each day at school / kindergarten time – worse for some reason in the afternoon – with cars banked up the length of Kings Road.

The difficulty is partly due to poor driving by those exiting Kings Rd and taking up the entire exit space. This is exacerbated by the white line being well off the median island so people do not think to use <u>all</u> the available space.

EMERALD HISTORY

The late Gus Ryberg lived in Emerald his whole life. The Scout Hall is named after him. During this time Gus wrote a weekly column in the local paper - "The Trader". In 1984 Gus wrote a book called - The Four W's being - What When Where and Who. A compilation of those weekly articles.

This is an excerpt from one of those articles - No. 40 - 13th October 1983.

"The year 1922 saw the Liquidators move into the holdings of Carl Axel Nobelius and the area known today as Emerald Country Club and all the land topside of Lakeside Drive, Emerald going north to the vicinity of Stewart Road, and mostly girded on the west by what is Nobelius Street today was acquired by a syndicate headed by Dr. Bottomley, a Collins Street Melbourne practitioner.

The syndicate included a Melbourne accountant named Chambers (who was connected with a Shale Oil enterprise in Tasmania). Others involved were another accountant named Lawson, Bib Stilwells father Bertie (who was Australian rep for spices firm McLintock), another accountant named Appleford and later a surveyor named Webb of Webb & Webb Surveyors..... Webb carried out the survey that resulted in Lakeside Drive, Sycamore Avenue, Poplar Crescent, Elm Street, Carramar Court and Oak Avenue forming the new subdivision of the Emerald Country Club.... It was subdivided into half acre blocks sold to finance the new Club.

Persons who purchased these blocks at 25 pounds were then listed as club members and this situation led to (once established) it being known to be the exclusive club that remained for many years until recently when membership was opened up to the public.

As these 1920's really were the forerunners to the years of "The Great Depression" and many of our local people were struggling to make a living and even the members of the original syndicate had become financially embarrassed.

Ab Watson of Macclesfield did all the early formation work and formed the lake which was an extension of a smaller one built by distillers - Bosistos. Bill Hunt, Perce Chapman and Sam Foxford were also involved in these works.

By the early 1920's the Club was established and the first Club Manager was a Mr Boys and his wife became chef at the Nobelius "big house'. The next chef was a Mrs Summers and at this stage a Pro Golfer named Jackson masterminded and supervised the layout of the first 9 holes of the golf course. He acted as manager and directed the green keeping which was done by Sam Foxford."
